2016 Season Outlook

Head coach **DJ Durkin** is set to embark on his first season at the helm of Maryland's football program since taking College Park by storm with his boundless energy and insatiable work ethic in December. Widely regarded for his recruiting ability, Durkin quickly pieced together an impressive coaching staff that includes two former FBS head coaches (**Mike London** and **Pete Lembo**) and a pair of bright young minds in offensive coordinator **Walt Bell** and defensive coordinator **Andy Buh**.

The Terps return seven starters on the offensive side of the ball in 2016. Among the offensive returners are quarterbacks senior **Perry Hills** (8 starts/1001 pass yds/8 TDs/535 rush yards) and senior **Caleb Rowe** (4 starts/894 yds/6 TDs), in addition to All-Big Ten left tackle **Michael Dunn**, who has made 37 career starts. Maryland also returns 88.4 percent of its reception yards and its top three pass catchers: **Levern Jacobs** (425 yds, 35 catches), **D.J. Moore** (357 yds, 25 catches) and **Taivon Jacobs** (264 yds, 21 catches).

The defense is highlighted by one of the most versatile and explosive players in the country in **William Likely**, who returns for his final season in College Park. The all-American return man and two-time first team All-Big Ten defensive back owns six Maryland records (two defensive, four special teams), and became the first defensive player in Maryland history to surpass 3,000 career all-purpose yards in 2015. He was the only player in FBS last season to make a start on both sides of the ball in the same game.

The defense also features middle linebacker **Jermaine Carter, Jr.**, who led the Terps with 103 tackles in 2015, in addition to posting 14.0 tackles for loss - the most for a Maryland middle linebacker since two-time all-American E.J. Henderson in 2002.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

QB

Maryland will have a number of options at quarterback in 2016 as seniors **Perry Hills** (15 career starts) and **Caleb Rowe** (7 career starts) return, in addition to redshirt freshman **Gage Shaffer**. The Terps also added a pair of freshmen QBs, including 2015 Gatorade Alabama Player of the Year **Tyrell Pigrome**.

WR

The Terps return nearly their entire receiving corps in 2016, including 88 percent of their total receiving yards. Leading the way are senior **Levern Jacobs** (425 yds, 3 TDs) and sophomore **D.J. Moore** (357 yds, 3 TDs), in addition to sophomore tight end **Avery Edwards**, who is expected to have an increased impact. Senior **Malcolm Culmer** is also back after a career-best season (221 yds, 2 TDs). Maryland also added New Mexico State fifth-year transfer **Teldrick Morgan**, who totaled 120 catches, 1,454 receiving yards and 11 touchdowns over the last two seasons.

WR

Senior **Levern Jacobs** has quietly climbed into the upper echelon of receivers in Maryland's history, ranking 17th in career receptions (89) and 22nd in career receiving yards (1,105). He needs just 11 catches to become the 14th player in history to reach 100 catches and needs 17 catches to move into the top-10. Jacobs is also one of just two returning receivers in the Big Ten who did not drop a pass in 2015.

RB

Maryland's rushing attack averaged more than 200 yards/g in 2015 for the first time since the 2001 season. The Terps will have to replace the workload of running back Brandon Ross (958 yards/10 TDs), who finished his career ranked fourth in career rushing yards. The Terps will look to **Wes Brown** (1,055 career rush yards/11 career rush TDs), **Ty Johnson** and Virginia Tech transfer **Trey Edmunds** to step up in the backfield.

OL

The Terps return just two linemen that made at least six starts in 2015: **Michael Dunn** (11 starts - 37 career) and **Damian Prince** (6 starts). With three starters graduating, Maryland will look to sophomore **Brendan Moore** (Rimington Watch List) to get the nod at center, while **Maurice Shelton** (2 starts in 2015), **JaJuan Dulaney**, **Sean Christie** and **Derwin Gray** will vie for the remaining positions.

UTIL

Senior **William Likely** made history against Wisconsin last season when he became the only player in the nation to start on both offense and defense (he also was the starting return specialist). Likely ran the ball 11 times and also totaled five catches on offense in 2015, and could be used on the offensive side of the ball in offensive coordinator **Walt Bell's** system as well.

WR Malcolm Culmer Sr.-3V 5-11, 192

- Led team with 14.7 yards per catch, setting career-highs in catches (15), yards (221) and touchdown catches (2). Started seven games in 2015.

OL Michael Dunn Sr.-3V 6-5, 300

- Former walk-on who has started 37 of Maryland's 38 games over the last three seasons, including 11 at left tackle in 2016. 2015 Honorable Mention All-Big Ten.

TE Avery Edwards So.-1V 6-4, 245

- Led Maryland tight ends in catches (14), yards (115) and touchdowns (2) as a true freshman in 2015.

QB Perry Hills Sr.-2V 6-2, 213

- Started eight games in 2015, passing for 1,001 yards and 8 TDs. Also ran for 535 yards - the fourth-most for a QB in Maryland history - including 170 rush yards at Ohio State - a program record for a QB.

WR Levern Jacobs Sr.-3V 5-11, 185

- Led team in receptions (35) and yards (425), and tied for team lead in TD catches (3) in 2015. Ranks 17th in Maryland history in catches (89) and 22nd in yards (1,105).

WR D.J. Moore So.-1V 5-11, 215

- Had three touchdown catches in 2015 - most for a true freshman at Maryland since Stefon Diggs (2012). Ranked second on team in catches (25) and yards (357) and had a catch in 11-of-12 games.

OL Damian Prince So.-1V 6-3, 315

- Made six starts at right tackle in 2015, including against Rutgers when Maryland had 401 rush yards - the most since 1999.

- Started 34 career games, including all 12 in 2015.

OL Evan Mulrooney 3V 6-3, 300

LB Jermaine Carter Jr.-2V 6-0, 235

• Earned Honorable Mention All-Big Ten in 2015 after leading team with 103 tackles. Also had 14.0 TFL's, the most for a Maryland middle linebacker since E.J. Henderson in 2002.

CB William Likely Sr.-3V 5-7, 176

• Two-time First Team All-Big Ten defensive back, leading team with 11 pass breakups in 2015. First defensive player in Maryland history to surpass 3,000 all-purpose yards.

DL Azubuike Ukandu Sr.-1V 6-0, 307

• Emerged as effective d-lineman in 2015, starting final eight games of season. Totaled 24 tackles, including 6.5 TFL and 2.5 sacks.

• Drafted by Pittsburgh Steelers in second round. Appeared in 50 career games (40 starts).

DB A.J. Hendy 4V 6-0, 208

DL Quinton Jefferson 3V 6-3, 289

• Drafted by Seattle Seahawks in fifth round. Appeared in 38 games, making 28 starts.

DL Yannick Ngakoue 3V 6-2, 255

• Drafted by Jacksonville Jaguars in third round after setting Maryland's single-season sack record (13.5). Appeared in 38 career games (22 starts).

DB Anthony Nixon 4V 6-1, 205

• Appeared in 48 games, making 41 starts.

LB Avery Thompson 4V 6-2, 228

• Appeared in 48 games, starting final seven games of 2015 season at linebacker.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEF

The Maryland defense will have a new look in 2016 as it overcomes the loss of six starters, including three NFL Draft selections, and welcomes the defensive philosophies of **DJ Durkin** and **Andy Buh**. Durkin spent the last three seasons as a defensive coordinator at both Michigan (2015) and Florida (2013-14), while Buh has been the defensive coordinator at Cal (2013), Nevada (2010-11) and Stanford (2008-09).

DB

The Terrapin secondary returns stalwart cornerback **William Likely**, but will look to replace three starters from a season ago. Fifth-year senior **Alvin Hill** (34 career appearances) will battle for the other starting cornerback position with sophomore **Darnell Savage** (10 appearances in 2015) and **Antwaine Carter** (back from season-ending injury in 2015). **Denzel Conyers**, **Josh Woods** and **Jarrett Ross** appear to be the frontrunners at safety. Conyers emerged last season in the final nine games for 15 tackles and three pass breakups.

CB

Maryland's first two-time first team all-conference defensive back since Keeta Covington (1985, 1986), **William Likely**, has returned for his senior season after an illustrious three-year career thus far. Likely is Maryland's active leader in interceptions (7), pass breakups (33) and tackles (197). He holds records for single-season interception return yards (170, 2014) and single-season interceptions returned for touchdown (2, 2014).

LB

Junior **Jermaine Carter, Jr.** returns as the heart and soul of the linebacking corps at middle linebacker, while fellow junior **Jalen Brooks** (64 tackles, 2 INTs in 2015) also returns to the fold. Junior **Shane Cockerille**, who has spent his career on the offensive side of the ball, has been moved to linebacker to take advantage of his athleticism and is making a strong case for a starting role. **Nnamdi Egbuaba** could also start, while **Isaiah Davis**, **Brett Zanotto** and **Gus Little** will provide depth.

LB

Junior middle linebacker **Jermaine Carter, Jr.** was spectacular in his first season as a starter for the Terps, leading the team with 103 tackles. The 2016 Butkus Award Watch List member totaled 14.0 tackles for loss last season - the most for a Maryland middle linebacker since two-time all-american EJ Henderson in 2002. Spectacularly, zero of his 14.0 TFLs were via quarterback sack.

DL

The Terrapin defensive line was one of the most dominant in the country last year, ranking 13th nationally with 2.92 sacks/g due in large part to 2016 NFL Draft selections Yannick Ngakoue (3rd Rd) and Quinton Jefferson (5th Rd). **Roman Braglio** returns at defensive end after a career-best season, while **David Shaw** is back from his season-ending injury in 2015. **Azubuike Ukandu** was tremendous in Shaw's absence, totaling 24 tackles and 6.5 TFLs in eight starts. Look for veterans **Cavon Walker** and **Jesse Aniebonam** to also make noise on the defensive line, in addition to Virginia Tech transfer **Melvin Keihn**, who sat out in 2015 due to NCAA transfer policy.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

RET

William Likely is recognized as one of the most dangerous return specialists in college football. Despite playing in just 11 games in 2015, Likely ranked third nationally with 1,197 combined return yards. The current owner of four Maryland return records, Likely is one of just two players in Maryland history with more than 2,000 career kick return yards (Torrey Smith, 2008-10).

P

Sophomore **Nicolas Pritchard** played in all 12 games in 2015 for the Terps, averaging 38.2 yards per punt and placing 13 punts inside the 20. Incoming freshman **Wade Lees**, a 28-year-old with an Australian Rules Football background, could make a strong case for the starting job during training camp.

PK

Maryland will be without the steady services of 2014 Lou Groza Award Winner Brad Craddock at placekicker, but is confident in the ability of junior **Adam Greene**. Greene kicked for the injured Craddock in the final three games of the 2015 season, making 3-of-5 field goal attempts and converting all 11 PATs.

DJ DURKIN

Head Coach

Bowling Green '01 • First Year at Maryland

DJ Durkin, one of the brightest young coaching minds in college football, was named the 36th head football coach in Maryland history on December 2, 2015.

Prior to arriving in College Park, Durkin served as the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at the University of Michigan, leading a nationally-renowned defensive unit that ranked fourth in the country. Under Durkin, the Wolverines limited opponents to 17.2 points per game in 2015, in addition to shutting out three consecutive opponents – the longest such streak at Michigan in 35 years.

Durkin has also been an outstanding recruiter in his time as an assistant. At Florida, Durkin helped land four straight top-11 recruiting classes and was named Rivals.com's 2012 Recruiter of the Year as a result. In total, Durkin contributed to the impressive recruitment of nine five-star prospects on the defensive side of the ball during that stretch.

Durkin's immediate impact in Ann Arbor was also displayed in player development. Michigan had nine defensive All-Big Ten honorees, including a pair of first team defensive backs: Jourdan Lewis and Jabril Peppers. In addition, three Wolverines (Ryan Glasgow, Lewis and Peppers,) were named semifinalists for national defensive awards in 2015. The Wolverines improved defense was a major reason for the program's four-win improvement over last season and for the team ranking as high as ninth in the nation.

As the defensive coordinator at Florida from 2013-14, Durkin led the Gators to consecutive top-15 rankings in total defense with the 15th-best mark in the country in 2014 (329.0 ypg) and the eighth-best (314.2 ypg) in 2013.

Florida's 2014 team finished the year ranked in the top-10 in the nation in yards allowed per play (4.45), yards allowed per rush attempt (3.16) and yards allowed per pass attempt (5.9).

The group was highlighted by All-SEC first team selections Dante Fowler Jr., and defensive back Vernon Hargreaves, along with second-team all-conference honoree Antonio Morrison. Fowler was subsequently selected third overall in the 2015 NFL Draft by the Jacksonville Jaguars. His selection continued a stretch in which Gator defensive players were selected in the first round of three consecutive drafts.

In Durkin's first season as defensive coordinator, Florida finished first in the SEC and seventh in the country in pass defense (171.8 yards per game), sixth in first downs allowed (16.1 per game) and 15th in scoring defense (21.1 points per game), while allowing only 27 touchdowns, the sixth fewest in the nation in 2013.

Durkin's coaching paid dividends at the next level when defensive tackle Dominique Easley was drafted by the New England Patriots in the first round of the 2014 NFL Draft.

From 2010-2012, Durkin served as special team coordinator and linebackers coach at Florida and coached under current Atlanta Falcons head coach Dan Quinn. Once again, Durkin was a key contributor of a staff that helped produce an NFL first round pick when defensive tackle Sha'fir Floyd was taken in the first round of the 2012 NFL Draft.

As linebackers coach, Durkin tutored Jon Bostic, who finished his career as a second-team All-SEC selection and was drafted in the second round of the NFL Draft by the Chicago Bears in 2013.

Durkin's coaching on special teams helped produce punter Chas Henry, the winner of the Ray Guy Award in 2011, and kicker Caleb Sturgis, a two-time finalist for the Lou Groza Award who now plays for the Philadelphia Eagles.

Under Durkin's tutelage, Stanford's defensive ends helped the Cardinal rank 11th nationally in sacks per game in 2007 and 2009.

At Stanford, Durkin helped the Cardinal bring in their highest ranked recruiting class in eight years in 2009.

As a graduate assistant at Notre Dame from 2003-04, Durkin worked primarily with defensive ends and helped develop Notre Dame all-time sack leader, All-Pro NFL defensive end and two-time Super Bowl champion Justin Tuck.

As a player, Durkin starred at Bowling Green as a starter at defensive end and outside linebacker from 1997-2000. He led the team in sacks in 1998 and served as a team captain for two seasons. Durkin was honored with numerous team awards including the Ken Schoeni Award for character and toughness, the Carlos Jackson Award personifying the values of a student-athlete and the Leadership Award.

Durkin played under Gary Blackney at Bowling Green. Blackney was Maryland's defensive coordinator from 2001-05.

He earned his bachelor's degree in business marketing from Bowling Green in 2001 and his master's degree in educational administration and supervision in 2004.

A native of Youngstown, Ohio, Durkin and his wife Sarah have one daughter, Abigail, and one son, Luke.

MIKE LONDON

Associate Head Coach/Defensive line
Richmond '83 • 1st Year at Maryland

Mike London was named Associate Head Coach/Defensive Line Coach on December 9, 2015.

London comes to College Park after serving as a head coach at Virginia and Richmond for the past eight seasons. A highly regarded recruiter, London helped bring in four top-35 classes during in tenure in Charlottesville and brought in two Virginia bred five-star recruits in 2014 (247Sports).

Mike London concluded his sixth season as head football coach at Virginia in 2015. During his tenure with the Cavalier program he developed a reputation as a coach who did things the right way and successfully passed that approach along to the student-athletes who played for him.

In the classroom the UVA football program's cumulative grade point average rose to its highest mark in over a decade, dozens of players graduated with remaining eligibility and went on to earn masters degrees and admission for mid-year enrollment went from being non-existent to having five players for the incoming class of 2016.

A former Richmond police detective, London's time in law enforcement dealing with the entire spectrum of human emotions and actions has provided a wealth of experience that he draws on to assist players both on and off the field. There are few stressful situations he has not faced - including having a loaded pistol pointed at him and the trigger pulled, only to have the weapon malfunction and not discharge its potentially lethal round.

London also had the remarkable opportunity to save one of his daughter's lives when he was identified as a perfect match for her rare bone marrow disorder. That opportunity is one reason why London is an advocate of servitude and makes sure his players understand and embrace the concept of giving back through a variety of community services activities. One of the most visible was the team's annual bone marrow donor registration drive as part of the national "Get in the Game, Save a Life" initiative.

London's biography includes plenty of chapters of football success on the field as well.

In the spring of 2014, defensive end Eli Harold was selected by the San Francisco 49ers and outside linebacker Max Valles later went to the Oakland Raiders to mark the 32nd consecutive season a UVA player has been picked in the NFL Draft, the second longest streak among ACC schools.

During the 2014 season as true freshman safety, Blanding earned freshman All-America honors and was named the ACC's Defensive Rookie of the Year.

In 2011, London led Virginia to one of its most outstanding seasons as the Cavaliers went 8-4 during the regular season, finished second in the ACC's Coastal Division with a 5-3 mark and played Auburn in the 2011 Chick-fil-A Bowl. The Cavaliers were one win from advancing to the ACC's Championship game.

UVA was ranked in the Associated Press Top-25 poll for the first time since the 2007 season.

For his efforts, London was recognized as the Atlantic Coast Conference's Coach of the Year. Five of his players earned either first or second-team All-ACC honors. The 2011 team saw two players - CB Chase Minnifield and OG Austin Pasztor - receive All-America honors and CB Demetrius Nicholson was named a Freshman All-American.

In two seasons at Richmond, London led the Spiders to a 24-5 record. In his first year at the helm, his team went 13-3 and won the Football Championship Series national title. The 2009 Spider team, ranked nine consecutive weeks at No. 1 in the FCS polls, went 11-2 and reached the quarterfinals of the FCS playoffs. His teams were 13-4 in the Colonial Athletic Association during the 2008 and 2009 campaigns.

London's efforts in 2008 earned him FCS National Coach of the Year honors from both the American Football Coaches Association and Schutt Sports/ American Football Monthly magazine. London was also honored as the Black Coaches Association Male Coach of the Year in 2008, beating out Mike Tomlin of the Super Bowl Champion Pittsburgh Steelers for the award.

Under London's watch, 16 Spiders were named to the All-CAA Football Team in 2009 after placing 12 in 2008. His first year at UR, nine Spiders garnered 15 All-America awards and six were recognized on the Academic All-Conference Team. DE Lawrence Sidbury was a fourth-round NFL draft pick by the Atlanta Falcons, while RB Josh Vaughan was a free-agent signee by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Before returning to coach his alma mater, London spent six of seven seasons coaching for Al Groh at Virginia. In 2001 London joined the UVA staff for the first time as the defensive line coach. He took over the responsibilities as recruiting coordinator in 2002. In 2005 London left UVA to work as the defensive line coach for the NFL's Houston Texas. He returned to Virginia in 2006 as the defensive coordinator and defensive line coach.

During his tenure with the Cavaliers, he saw five defensive players (Chris Long, Marcus Hamilton, Chris Canty, Andrew Hoffman and Monsanto Pope) drafted by NFL teams. Long was the ACC Defensive Player of the Year in 2007, earned unanimous All-America honors, was the Ted Hendricks Award winner as the nation's top defensive end and the second overall selection in the 2008 NFL Draft.

A native of Hampton, Va., London played defensive back at Richmond from 1979-82. Under head coach Dal Shealy, he led the Spiders with six interceptions as a senior captain in 1982. In addition to earning all-state honors, he was chosen the team's MVP and received the Spiders' Coaches Award.

London graduated from Richmond in 1983 with a bachelor's degree in sociology and a year later received a degree in law enforcement from the Richmond Police

He returned to Richmond for two more years (1995-96) as the outside linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator. London served as defensive line coach at Boston College for the 1997-2000 seasons, where he helped lead the Eagles to two bowl appearances.

London and his wife Regina, are the parents of four children - Ticynn, Korben, Jaicyn and Madicyn. He has three older children, Michael, Jr., Brandon and Kristen through a previous marriage.



PETE LEMBO

Asst. Head Coach/Special Teams Coord./Tight Ends
Georgetown '92 • First Year at Maryland

Pete Lembo was named as Assistant Head Coach/Special Teams Coordinator on December 22, 2015. Lembo had spent the prior five seasons as Ball State's Head Coach.

Ball State set more than 60 school records during Lembo's tenure as head coach, including single-season records for points (501), total offense (6,199 yards), passing yards (4,214), touchdown passes (35) and total touchdowns (64) in 2013.

Lembo has excelled coaching special teams, especially during his tenure at Ball State. The Cardinals ranked among the top three schools in the Mid-American Conference in a compilation of league special teams statistics in each of his five years, leading the league in 2012. Lembo coached five different players to all-conference honors on the special teams side of the ball. Placekicker Steve Schott was a Lou Groza semifinalist and punter Scott Kovanda was a Ray Guy finalist in 2012. Placekicker Scott Secor was named the MAC Special Teams Player of the Year in 2014.

Lembo was 112-65 during his 15 years serving as head coach at Ball State (2011-15), Lehigh (2001-05) and Elon (2006-10). He was 33-29 during his five year tenure at Ball State, posting a 23-17 record in the MAC.

Several players from Lembo's Ball State teams are enjoying successful careers in the National Football League including wide receiver Willie Snead (New Orleans Saints), defensive end Jon Newsome (Indianapolis Colts) and quarterback Keith Wenning (Cincinnati Bengals), among others. While at Ball State, Lembo also coached tight end Zane Fakes, a two-time first team All-MAC tight end. Fakes was also a two-time Academic All-MAC selection and a 2013 Campbell trophy semi-finalist.

Lembo was the first head coach in Ball State history to win at least 30 games in his first four seasons at the helm. He guided the Cardinals to a 10-3 overall record in 2013, including a second straight bowl appearance when Ball State played in the GoDaddy Bowl. It marked just the second time in 91 years of football at Ball State that the Cardinals played in back-to-back bowl games.

A 23-year coaching veteran, Lembo was one of 20 coaches in country named to the 2013 Paul Bear Bryant National Coach of the Year Award Watch List.

In 2012, Lembo led the Cardinals to a 9-4 overall record and a 6-2 MAC mark in his second season. He guided Ball State to the 2012 Beef 'O' Brady's Bowl St. Petersburg in only his second season at the helm.

Prior to Ball State, Lembo was one of the most successful coaches in Lehigh history, posting a 44-14 mark as head coach. He led Lehigh to the 2001 and 2004 Patriot League Championship and berths in the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) playoffs. His .759 overall winning percentage and .778 league winning percentage at Lehigh are both the second highest in Patriot League history. He was named the Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year and the Patriot League Coach of the Year in 2001 when his squad finished 11-1 and ranked fifth in both NCAA I-AA polls.

Lembo also found success as Elon's Head Coach from 2006-10. He led the Phoenix to 35 victories in five years after taking over a program that tallied a 14-42 record in the five years prior to his arrival. Lembo's Elon teams broke 124 NCAA, Southern Conference and school records during his tenure and posted a 24-14 record in the Southern Conference. He was named the 2007 SoCon Coach of the Year and the Phoenix averaged more than 400 yards of offense per game during each of his final four seasons at the school.

Before taking over at Elon, Lembo served as an assistant coach at Lehigh from 1998-2000. He was also an assistant coach at Hampden-Sydney (1997), Dartmouth (1994-96) and Albany (1992-93).

A native of Staten Island, New York, Lembo is married with three children. He stared at Monsignor Farrell High School in Staten Island before becoming a four-year starter on the offensive line at Georgetown. He was named a team captain during the 1991 season and graduated from Georgetown in 1992. Lembo earned his Master's degree from Albany in 1994.

ANDY BUH

Defensive Coordinator

Nevada '96 • First Year at Maryland

Andy Buh was hired as Maryland's defensive coordinator in the spring of 2016. Buh, who has previously served as the defensive coordinator at Stanford, Nevada and Cal, came to Maryland from the University of Kentucky, where he was the outside linebackers coach since 2015 and had been recently promoted to also serve as special teams coordinator. Durkin and Buh were on the same staff at Stanford from 2007-09.

Buh (pronounced same as "boo") has 18 years of coaching experience and has helped engineer major turnarounds at Stanford and Nevada. His teams made four consecutive bowl appearances from 2009-12 and he's sent numerous players to the National Football League.

While only at Kentucky for one season, Buh made an immediate impact. The Wildcats allowed just 198.1 yards per game through the air, ranking fifth in the SEC and Top 30 nationally in passing defense. Kentucky was also stingy in the red zone during Buh's tenure, ranking fourth in the conference and 14th nationally by allowing opponents to score just 75 percent of the time. The Wildcats also forced nine fumbles in 2015, ranking fourth in the SEC.

Buh also coached at the University of California, where he was the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach in 2013. The Golden Bear defense was ravaged by injuries that year as 16 players from the team's preseason two-deep were sidelined for a total of 109 games. A highlight was the performance of defensive lineman Deandre Coleman, who earned third-team All-Pac-12 honors and currently plays for the Miami Dolphins.

Buh was the linebackers coach at Wisconsin in 2012 and the UW defense ranked in the nation's top 25 in several statistical categories. The Badgers were 15th in the nation in total defense (322.6 yards per game), 17th in scoring defense (19.1 points per game), 22nd in pass efficiency defense and 24th in rushing defense. Wisconsin was even better during the regular-season Big Ten contests, allowing just 18.3 points per game to rank second in the league.

Individually, Wisconsin linebacker Mike Taylor had 123 tackles and ranked 25th in the nation in total stops. Linebacker Chris Borland received All-Big Ten honors. Borland played for the San Francisco 49ers and Taylor was on the reserve squad for the Seattle Seahawks.

Prior to Wisconsin, Buh was defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Nevada in 2010-11. In his first season, Buh helped lead Nevada to arguably the greatest season in school history with a 13-1 record, tying for the Western Athletic Conference championship and defeating Boston College in the Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl. Nevada ranked 31st in the nation in scoring defense (21.4 ppg) and 18th nationally in rushing defense at 120.3 yards per game. The Wolf Pack rated 24th nationally in sacks with 35 QB takedowns, 2.5 per game. Defensive end Dontay Moch had 22 tackles for loss, leading the WAC and rating 10th nationally with 1.57 TFL per game. Moch was a third-round draft pick by the Cincinnati Bengals and currently plays for

the Atlanta Falcons.

The Wolf Pack went 7-6 in his first season and played No. 22-ranked Southern Mississippi in the Hawaii Bowl, limiting the nation's No. 15 scoring offense to 13 points and 125 yards below its season average. Nevada was led by first-team All-America defensive tackle Brett Roy, who had 18.5 tackles for loss, pacing the WAC and ranking 12th nationally with 1.4 TFL per game. Included were 10 quarterback sacks, with Roy ranking second in the WAC and 13th in the country at 0.77 per game.

Buh's success came after inheriting a unit that had ranked 96th and 91st nationally in total defense in 2008 and '09, respectively, the two seasons before his arrival. In his two years at Nevada, the Wolf Pack was 54th in the country in total defense in 2010 and 52nd in 2011.

Buh also was part of a major turnaround during his term at Stanford. He was linebackers coach in 2007 for a team that had gone 1-11 the year before. The 2007 squad improved to four wins, including one of the greatest upsets in college football history -- as a 41-point underdog, the Cardinal scored a 24-23 road victory at Southern California. Buh was promoted by then-head coach Jim Harbaugh to co-defensive coordinator for his final two seasons.

In his first year as co-defensive coordinator, Stanford ranked 11th nationally in quarterback sacks and improved to five wins. Three Cardinal defenders were named All-Pac-12. In 2009, Stanford played in the Sun Bowl, the school's first bowl appearance since 2001, and had four players receive All-Pac-12 honors, including NFL All-Pro cornerback Richard Sherman.

A native of Escondido, Calif., Buh played linebacker for two seasons at Palomar College, where he helped the team to a share of the 1991 Junior College Grid-Wire national championship as a freshman. He was a junior-college All-American as a sophomore.

Buh went on to play at Nevada in 1993-94 and was a part of a Big West championship team as a senior. He graduated with a degree in physical education and began his coaching career at his high school alma mater, Orange Glen HS, in 1996.

Buh entered the collegiate coaching ranks at Nevada as a graduate assistant in 1997-98 and coached defensive backs and special teams in '99. He was a defensive administrative assistant at California in 2000-01.

Buh coached linebackers at San Diego State at 2002-05. During his time with the Aztecs, Buh coached four players who went on to the NFL, including Kirk Morrison, a first-team All-American, two-time Mountain West Conference Defensive Player of the Year and three-time All-MWC selection. Morrison went on to play eight years in the NFL. Buh coached one season at Fresno State before going to Stanford.

Buh's wife, Kelly, is a native of New Albany, Ind. They have two sons, Luke and Logan.

Offensive Coordinator/Quarterbacks

Middle Tennessee State '05 • First Year at Maryland

Walt Bell, one of the most dynamic young offensive minds in college football, was named Maryland's Offensive Coordinator, on December 20, 2015.

Bell joined the Maryland staff after serving as offensive coordinator, assistant head coach and quarterbacks coach at Arkansas State the last two seasons. The Red Wolves currently rank 14th nationally in scoring offense, averaging 40.0 points per game.

In his 26 games overseeing the Arkansas State offense, the Red Wolves have posted over 300 yards 24 times, over 400 yards 18 times and over 500 yards 11 times.

Bell helped Arkansas State placed eight offensive players on the 2015 All-Sun Belt Conference Team. Junior offensive linemen Jemar Clark and Colton Jackson, and senior wide receiver J.D. McKissic were first team all-conference selections.

In Bell's first year at Arkansas State, the Red Wolves broke five school records on the offensive side of the ball. The high-tempo offense posted 6,194 yards of total offense, averaged 476.5 yards per game, ran 1,024 plays, scored 477 points and totaled 65 touchdowns. Bell's offensive unit ranked among the top 45 teams in the nation in seven statistical categories, including scoring offense (No. 18), total offense (No. 20), rushing offense (No. 25), first downs (No. 30), completion percentage (No. 36), team passing efficiency (No. 38) and passing offense (No. 39).

Bell, who has been a part of 10 bowl games as either a coach or player, came to Arkansas State after spending the previous two seasons as North Carolina's tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator. Bell was part of an offensive staff that helped North Carolina break over 35 school records.

Bell helped North Carolina average 432.4 total yards per game during the 2013 season. Coaching the tight ends position, he was part of a passing game that ranked 28th in the nation with an average of 277.4 yards per game. Bell also helped lead UNC to the 2012 Atlantic Coast Conference Coastal Division title, the same year the Tar Heels ranked 14th nationally with 485.6 yards per game.

Under Bell's tutelage, tight end Eric Ebron was a two-time All-ACC pick and named First Team All-America in 2013. Ebron finished the 2013 season with 973 receiving yards, the most by any tight end in ACC history. Bell's initial season at UNC saw Ebron triple his output over the previous year, hauling in 40 receptions for 625 yards.

Bell also helped the Tar Heels build a pair of strong recruiting classes. The 2012 class ranked among the top five in the ACC despite a lack of available scholarships, and the 2013 class was among the top four in the conference.

Bell went to North Carolina after coaching wide receivers at Southern Miss. He was part of a Southern Miss offensive staff that helped the Golden Eagles establish school records for total offense with 6,459 yards in 2011. USM ranked 17th in the nation in total offense and 14th in scoring offense as the Golden Eagles had their best season in school history.

Southern Miss won the Conference USA championship over previously unbeaten Houston and then won its school-record 12th game of the year by beating Nevada in the Hawaii Bowl. Bell's wide receivers were a big reason for USM's success. The top four receivers on the team all had more than 30 receptions, led by Kelvin Bolden who posted a team-high 58 catches for 671 yards and seven touchdowns. Ryan Ballentine led the team in yards (742) and touchdowns (8) on 49 catches.

Before becoming a full-time assistant at USM, Bell spent one season as the team's offensive graduate assistant in 2010 when the team played Louisville in the Beef 'O' Brady Bowl. With his input, the Golden Eagles set new offensive records for production that year, including a then-school record 5,894 yards and 453.38 yards per game.

Prior to Southern Miss, Bell spent a season as a quality control coach at Oklahoma State. His lone season at OSU saw the Cowboys post a 9-4 record and play in the Cotton Bowl. Before Oklahoma State, Bell worked two years as a graduate assistant at Memphis following his playing days at Middle Tennessee. The Tigers played in back-to-back bowl games during Bell's tenure at the school, including the 2008 St. Petersburg Bowl and the 2007 New Orleans Bowl.

Bell, a Dickson, Tennessee native, earned both his bachelor's degree (criminal justice administration, 2005) and master's degree (sports management, 2006) from Middle Tennessee, where he was a four-year letterman at wide receiver for the Blue Raiders. Bell also worked at Louisiana-Lafayette for one spring following his final season at MTSU.

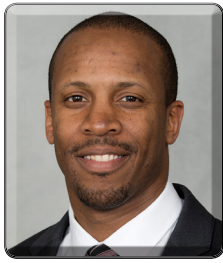

Maryland's single-season sacks leader in 2015 before being selected in the third round of the 2016 NFL Draft by the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Abdul-Rahim also founded "Cover One", a defensive back training academy that has worked with 25 NFL players.

The Washington D.C. native played two seasons at San Diego State (1997-1998) after a stint at Mesa Community College. After college, the Dunbar High School standout, played for the San Diego Riptide of the Arena Football League.

After stops at the University of Florida and the University of Michigan, Matt Barnes joined the Maryland football coaching staff as the linebackers coach in January 2016.

Barnes spent the 2015 season as the defensive analyst at the University of Michigan under the then-defensive coordinator Durkin and head coach Jim Harbaugh. The Wolverine defense ranked first nationally in defensive pass efficiency, third in passing yards allowed, fourth in total defense and 11th in scoring defense. On game days, he served as the primary scout in the box and contributed to sideline and halftime adjustments.

Prior to Michigan, Barnes served as a defensive and special teams graduate assistant for three years at the University of Florida from 2012-14. He worked directly under the defensive and special teams coordinators, assisting a 2014 Gator defense that ranked 15th nationally in total defense and 10th in defensive pass efficiency.

Florida's special teams unit also achieved immense success during Barnes' tenure, ranking second nationally in kickoff coverage and third in punt returns in 2013.

He directly assisted DJ Durkin, who was named the footballscoop.com Special Teams Coordinator of the Year in 2012.

Barnes spent the 2011 season as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at West Virginia Wesleyan College, where he helped coach all-american quarterback Adam Neugebauer to Division II Quarterback of the Year honors. Barnes' offense led the conference in total offense, passing offense, passing efficiency and first downs. He signed over 25 prospects throughout the east coast, served as the academic coordinator and was involved in all areas of program management.

Barnes began his coaching career in 2009 as the running backs coach at Delaware Valley College, before beginning his first stint at West Virginia Wesleyan in 2010 as running backs coach.

Barnes is a 2008 graduate of Salisbury University on Maryland's eastern shore, where he was elected as team captain by teammates and was a candidate for the Draddy Trophy Award.

Boasting 10 years of FBS coaching experience, Chris Beatty joined the Maryland football coaching staff as the wide receivers coach in January of 2016 as part of head coach DJ Durkin's first staff in College Park.

Beatty has prior FBS stops at Virginia (2015), Wisconsin (2013-14), Illinois (2012), Vanderbilt (2011), West Virginia (2008-10) and Northern Illinois (2007). He comes to College Park having coached a variety of offensive positions.

Beatty served as assistant head coach/running backs coach at Virginia, coached wide receivers for two years and spent one season as the recruiting coordinator at Wisconsin, served as co-offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Illinois, coached wide receivers and was the recruiting coordinator at Vanderbilt, oversaw the running backs and slot receivers at West Virginia and served as the running backs coach at Northern Illinois.

This past season, Beatty worked under current Maryland Associate Head Coach Mike London at Virginia. He oversaw the rise of junior running back Taquan Mizzell, who broke the ACC record for receiving yards by a running back in a season with 721 on his way to third-team All-ACC honors.

Beatty helped guide Wisconsin to an 11-3 record in 2014, including a 34-31 overtime win over Auburn in the Outback Bowl. In 2013, Beatty helped senior wide receiver Jared Abbrederis set the school record for receptions in a season (78) and become just the third receiver in school history to compile over 1,000 receiving yards in a season with 1,081. Abbrederis, who went on to be selected by the Green Bay Packers in the 2014 NFL Draft, was a consensus first-team All-Big Ten selection.

While at Vanderbilt, Beatty helped the Commodores win the 2011 Liberty Bowl, and prior to that, he was part of three straight bowl appearances during his time at West Virginia. His stint with the Mountaineers also included the 2010 Big East championship.

While at West Virginia, Beatty coached running back Noel Devine, who rushed for more than 3,600 yards under Beatty's direction and earned a pair of All-BIG EAST honors.

Ten of Beatty's former players have gone on to the NFL, and he also mentored 14 all-conference performers.

A 1995 graduate of East Tennessee State, where he was a standout wide receiver, Beatty played professionally in the Canadian Football League before becoming a successful high school coach in Virginia. A native of Centreville, Va., Beatty led Landstown High School to a 40-2 record from 2003-05 and won a state championship with a team that featured current Buffalo Bills wide receiver Percy Harvin.

Beatty's first coaching job was at Hampton, where he served as offensive coordinator and running backs coach in 2006. Beatty directed Hampton to the 2006 Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference championship and a berth in the FCS playoffs. The Pirates ranked No. 7 in the FCS with an average of 34.7 points per game, with three of Beatty's wide receivers – Dereck Faulkner, Onrea Jones and Marquay McDaniel – eventually earning playing time in the NFL.

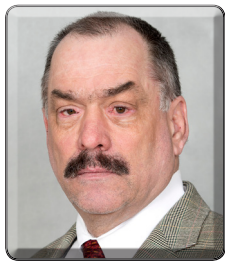

Offensive Line

DePauw '82 • First Year at Maryland

Dave Borbely, who brings 35 years of coaching experience, was hired by head coach DJ Durkin in January 2016 to coach the Terps offensive line. Borbely has coached the offensive line at nine schools, including Stanford, Notre Dame, Colorado, Louisville and Virginia.

Borbely most recently served as offensive line coach under current Maryland Associate Head Coach Mike London at Virginia during the 2015 season. It marked his fifth season overall in Charlottesville as Borbely was UVA's running game coordinator and offensive line coach from 2006-09.

During his first stint at UVA, Borbely tutored senior offensive tackle Eugene Monroe to several 2008 All-America squads, including second-team honors by the Associated Press and Walter Camp Football Foundation. Monroe also received the Jacobs Blocking Trophy, given to the ACC's top blocker. In his time with the Cavaliers, Borbely also coached Branden Albert, a third-team AP All-American in 2007, as well as offensive guard Austin Pasztor in 2008 and 2009, who later was a second-team AP All-American in 2011. All three offensive linemen are now in the NFL.

In between his two stints at Virginia, Borbely was on Charlie Strong's staff at Louisville (2010-13) for four seasons before spending the 2014 season helping lead Colorado State-Pueblo to the NCAA DII national championship. He served as the running game coordinator and offensive line coach at both stops.

Borbely's teams have reached 13 bowl games, including the Sugar Bowl (1986, 2013) and the Fiesta Bowl (2001). He helped Louisville earn three bowl game wins and a postseason appearance in each of his four seasons there. The Cardinals captured the 2012 and 2013 BIG EAST title and won the 2013 Sugar Bowl over Florida. During Borbely's final two seasons at Louisville, the Cardinals went a combined 23-3 and were ranked amongst the nation's top 20 programs both seasons.

In his time at Louisville, Borbely helped guide and develop two all-conference offensive linemen in 2010, 2012 and 2013 as well as Jake Smith, Louisville's first FWAA freshman All-American in 2011. Included in that bunch was walk-on Alex Kupper, now playing for the Houston Texans, and 2011 NFL Draft sixth-round selection Byron Stingily of the Tennessee Titans.

Prior to his first stint with UVA, Borbely spent four seasons as the offensive line coach at Colorado for Gary Barnett.

Borbely's wide-range of coaching experience has allowed him to develop an extensive recruiting base, including the Northeast and West Coast. He has coached for some of the top names in collegiate football including Barnett, Strong, Tyrone Willingham and Phillip Fulmer.

During Borbely's four years at Colorado, the Buffs made three bowl appearances and won the Big 12 Northern Division three times. In 2002, his first season with the Buffs, Colorado finished sixth in the nation in rushing. In 2005, he coached Mark Fenton, a first-team All-Big 12 performer who was one of six finalists for the Dave Rimington Award presented to the nation's top center.

Prior to his stint at Colorado, Borbely was the offensive line coach at Notre Dame from 1998 to 2001. While with the Irish, he coached in two New Year's Day bowls (1999 Gator and 2001 Fiesta). During each of his first three seasons with the Irish, the Notre Dame offense ranked in the top-30 nationally in rushing. From 1995 to 1997 Borbely was the offensive line coach at Stanford where he helped the Cardinal to Liberty and Sun Bowl invitations following the '95 and '96 seasons. In 1996, Borbely had two linemen, Brad Badger and Nate Parks, selected in the NFL draft.

His previous assistant coaching stops included Tulane from 1992 to 1994, Temple from 1989 to 1991 and Rice from 1986 to 1988.

Borbely started his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Evansville from 1981 to 1982. He was the freshman defensive line coach at Pennsylvania in 1983 and received his first coaching opportunity on the Division I level as a graduate assistant for Phillip Fulmer at Tennessee from 1984 to 1985.

A native of Hammond, Ind., Borbely earned his bachelor of arts degree in history from DePauw (Ind.) University and a master of arts in secondary education from the University of Evansville in 1982. At DePauw, he earned four letters in football and twice was named the team's top lineman.

Borbely and his wife, Bev, have three children - Joseph, Laura and Brian.

Anthony Tucker joined the Maryland football coaching staff as the running backs coach in January of 2016 as part of head coach DJ Durkin's first staff in College Park.

Tucker has spent the last three seasons at Arkansas State, serving as running backs coach from 2014-15 and wide receivers coach in 2013.

The Red Wolves were extremely successful during Tucker's tenure, claiming the Sun Belt Conference championship in 2013 and 2015, and earning trips to bowl games during all three seasons.

Under Tucker's tutelage in 2015, Arkansas State ranked 15th in the FBS in rushing offense, averaging 231.3 yards per game on the ground. The Red Wolves racked up 3,007 rushing yards on the season and rushed for 4.95 yards per carry. Arkansas State also set school records in both points scored (520) and touchdowns (69).

During his first season as the running backs coach in 2014, the Red Wolves set school records for total offense (6,194 yards), average yards per game (476.5) and total plays (1,024). Arkansas State ranked No. 18 in the nation in scoring offense, No. 25 in rushing offense and No. 30 in first downs.

Red Wolves running back Michael Gordon rushed for a combined 2,162 yards and 24 touchdowns during his two years under Tucker's guidance. He was named a second team All-Sun Belt Conference pick both years. In addition, freshman running back Warren Ward was recognized on the leagues newcomer team in 2015 after rushing for 709 yards and five touchdowns during his first season.

Tucker came to Arkansas State after spending the previous two seasons at Idaho State, where he coached wide receivers for a squad that ranked among the top 10 in the nation in passing yards in back-to-back years. Led by All-America wide receiver Rodrick Rumble, the Bengals averaged 351.6 passing yards per game in 2012 to rank fourth nationally, while the 2011 team held the nation's ninth-best average at 300.6 yards per game.

Prior to joining Idaho State, Tucker served the 2010 season as Colorado's Offensive Technical Assistant under then-head coach Dan Hawkins. Tucker went to Colorado after spending the 2006-09 seasons as Lakewood (Calif.) High School's Passing Game Coordinator and Wide Receivers Coach. He also coached the wide receivers in the Best of the West Quarterback and Wide Receivers Skills Camp in 2008 and 2009 in Lakewood.

Tucker spent four seasons in the NFL, signing as a free agent with the New York Giants in 1999 and later earning a spot on the team's practice squad in 2000. He was allocated to NFL Europe from the Giants in 2001 and played for the Amsterdam Admirals. He signed with the St. Louis Rams in 2002 and then suffered a career-ending leg injury.

A three-year letterman at Fresno State, Tucker started at wide receiver his last two seasons with the Bulldogs. Tucker earned his Bachelor of Science degree in criminology in 1999 from Fresno State, where he was a WAC Scholar-Athlete, member of the dean's list three times and earned President's List honors one time for having a 4.0 GPA.

GAME 1 RECAP: RICHMOND

LIKELY SHINES IN TERPS' SEASON-OPENING WIN

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - William Likely set a Big Ten record with 233 yards in punt returns and Brandon Ross ran for career-high 150 yards and one touchdown as Maryland rolled to a season-opening 50-21 victory over Richmond on Saturday.

Perry Hills threw two touchdown passes for the Terrapins, who scored 37 straight points after falling behind 14-13 in the second quarter.

Likely returned eight punts, including a 67-yarder for a touchdown that made it 43-14 with 10:30 remaining. He had another return of 47 yards.

The 5-foot-7 junior also had two kickoff returns for 63 yards, giving him 296 yards in kick returns for the afternoon.

Ross averaged 8.3 yards per carry and put Maryland up 29-14 with a 21-yard TD run early in the third quarter. He eclipsed his previous career high of 149 yards before the quarter ended.

Making his first start since 2012, Hills completed 12 of 21 passes for 138 yards and an interception. The junior wasn't exceptionally sharp, but he didn't have to be because the Terrapins totaled 341 yards on the ground.

Richmond's Kyle Lauletta went 18 for 30 for 220 yards. The Spiders mustered only 56 yards rushing, and Lauletta was sacked four times.

After Maryland took a quick 10-0 lead, Richmond went ahead 14-13 on a 4-yard run by Lauletta with 10:35 left in the second quarter.

Hills then directed a 12-play drive that produced a field goal by Brad Craddock, and a 37-yard touchdown catch by Malcolm Culmer made it 22-14 at halftime.

Ross scored the only touchdown of the third quarter, and a 1-yard touchdown run by Wes Brown made it 36-14.

Maryland then forced a punt, and Likely weaved his way through the Richmond defense before getting to the left sideline and diving into the end zone.

His 233-yard performance on punt returns broke the record set by Nile Kinnick of Iowa in 1939.

With the victory, Maryland improved to 5-0 in openers under coach Randy Edsall. The Terrapins have won six straight season openers and 11 of 12.

MARYLAND FALLS TO BOWLING GREEN

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Junior William Likely returned a punt for a touchdown for the second straight week, but Maryland fell to Bowling Green, 48-27, for its first loss of the season Saturday afternoon at Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium.

Likely's 85-yard punt return is tied for the second longest punt return in school history, matching the 85-yarder by Tony Logan against Florida International in 2010. The school record for the longest punt return belongs to Dick Nolan, who returned a punt 90 yards against Clemson in 1953.

Senior Brad Craddock added a pair of first half field goals to give the Terps (1-1) a 13-6 lead over Bowling Green (1-1) at the half.

After a 55-minute weather delay pushed back the start of the third quarter, a 58-yard TD pass from Matt Johnson to Roger Lewis tied the game at 13-13 less than three minutes into the second half.

Maryland responded with a big play of its own to go back in front 20-13 when junior Perry Hills hooked up with D.J. Moore on a slant that the true freshman took 42 yards to the end zone.

The Terps looked to have stopped Bowling Green on its ensuing drive when Alvin Hill picked off a Johnson pass in the end zone, but an offside penalty on the Terps gave the Falcons a first-and-goal opportunity that Travis Greene converted into a score on the very next play to tie things at 20-20.

Bowling Green outscored the Terps 28-7 in the fourth quarter to earn the victory in the team's first-ever meeting.

Johnson completed eight of 10 throws in the final frame, posting 134 yards and four touchdowns in the fourth quarter.

After the Falcons took their first lead of the game less than a minute into the fourth quarter, Maryland answered back with an 8-play, 75-yard scoring drive that was capped by a 22-yard TD pass from Hills to junior Levern Jacobs.

The Terrapins struggled down the stretch, turning the ball over on their final three drives.

Hills finished the game completing 15 of 30 passes for 150 yards and two touchdowns, while also compiling 94 yards on the ground on eight rushes.

Junior Yannick Ngakoue posted a career-high three sacks, while senior Sean Davis finished the game with 14 tackles to pace the Maryland defense.

ROWE THROWS FOR 4TDs IN WIN OVER USF

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Caleb Rowe threw for 297 yards and four touchdowns in his first start since 2013, and Maryland notched a 35-17 victory over South Florida on Saturday.

Despite throwing three interceptions, the junior completed 21 of 33 passes and provided enough big plays to help the Terrapins (2-1) finish with 411 yards in offense.

Rowe threw touchdown passes of 12 and 22 yards to Avery Edwards; connected with Taivon Jacobs for a 70-yard score and hit Kenneth Goins Jr. for a 1-yard TD.

Maryland fumbled three times and totaled 12 penalties for 120 yards, but South Florida (1-2) also had its share of miscues -- including two turnovers, a dropped potential touchdown pass, a holding call that wiped out a touchdown run, and a personal foul penalty that erased a fourth-quarter first down when the score was 28-17.

USF quarterback Quinton Flowers went 10 for 19 for 60 yards with a touchdown pass and an interception. He was replaced for a series in the fourth quarter by Steve Bench, who was 0 for 3 with a pick.

The game turned late in the first half after South Florida used a 12-play drive to get a field goal and close to 14-10.

Starting at his own 34 with 52 seconds left, Rowe completed passes of 10 and 49 yards to Levern Jacobs. On first-and-goal at the USF 2, Rowe botched a pitch to Brandon Ross, who picked up the ball and took it into the end zone with 10 seconds remaining.

Maryland opened the second half with 45-yard kickoff return by Ty Johnson. Five plays later, Edwards made an excellent over-the-shoulder catch of a Rowe pass in the end zone for a 28-10 lead.

That proved to be enough to assure the Terrapins their second victory of the season.

Maryland's opening drive ended when USF's Devin Abraham returned an interception 42 yards, setting up a 4-yard touchdown pass from Flowers to Rodney Adams.

Rowe bounced back to direct a 59-yard drive, capped by a TD pass to Goins. Then, on the last play of the quarter, Rowe connected with Jacobs deep on the right sideline for a 70-yard score.

Last year, South Florida led Maryland in the fourth quarter before falling 24-17. In this one, the Terrapins took control much earlier and breezed through the final 15 minutes.

DESPITE STRONG START, TERPS FALL AT #1 OSU

COLUMBUS, Ohio - Perry Hills set a new program quarterback record with 170 rushing yards but the Maryland football team fell, 49-28, to No. 1 Ohio State on Saturday.

Hills rushed for two touchdowns and threw for another one, a 52-yard pass to D.J. Moore in the first quarter. The junior finished the afternoon with 133 passing yards.

The game swung in the Terrapins' favor when Ohio State missed a 44-yard field goal with 1:12 remaining in the first half. On the first play from scrimmage, Hills broke loose for a 75-yard scamper through the heart of the Buckeye defense. Hills then finished the drive with a 3-yard rush into the endzone to draw the Terps within a touchdown, 21-14, heading into halftime.

The Terps carried their momentum into the second half, capping off a 9-play, 69-yard drive with a 4-yard Hill touchdown rush to tie the game, 21-21.

The stardom of the Buckeyes (6-0, 2-0 Big Ten) and running back Ezekiel Elliott (2 TD's) proved too much for the Terrapins (2-4, 0-2) as they shook free in the second half and extended their nation's best winning streak to 19. Ohio State has won 26 straight regular-season conference games.

Ohio State coach Urban Meyer juggled his quarterbacks, using Jones to start drives and Barrett to finish them. Jones threw a 19-yard TD pass to Braxton Miller and connected on a 48-yarder to Jalin Marshall.

Trailing, 49-21, late in the game, Maryland used six plays and a 1-yard Wes Brown touchdown run to finish the scoring.

TERPS RALLY FALLS SHORT vs. PENN STATE

BALTIMORE, Md. - A 27-yard touchdown pass early in the fourth quarter by Christian Hackenberg lifted Penn State to a 31-30 victory over Maryland Saturday afternoon in front of 68,948 at M&T Bank Stadium.

Penn State improves to 6-2 overall and 3-1 in the Big Ten, while Maryland falls to 2-5 on the year and 0-3 in league play.

Maryland led in the fourth quarter after junior Perry Hills directed an 88-yard march that ended with a 10-yard touchdown pass to DeAndre Lane, making it 27-24. The touchdown reception was the first in Lane's career.

Hills ran for 128 yards and completed 19 of 28 passes for 225 yards. He's the first Terp to run for 100 yards in consecutive games since C.J. Brown accomplished the feat in 2011.

Penn State regained the lead, 31-27, with 13:39 left when Hackenberg hit Geno Lewis.

Maryland cut the gap with a field goal to make it 31-30, but the Terps committed turnovers on three of their final four possessions to come up short.

TERPS COME UP SHORT vs. BADGERS, 31-24

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Maryland put up a fight on Homecoming, with Perry Hills and Caleb Rowe each throwing for a score, but Wisconsin was able to hold on to defeat the Terps, 31-24, in front of 44,678 at Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium.

Wisconsin won its fifth straight game to improve to 8-2 overall and 5-1 in the Big 10. The Terps fall to 2-7 on the year and 0-5 in league play.

Junior running back Wes Brown rushed for a seven-yard touchdown to give Maryland a 7-0 lead in the first quarter. It was his third touchdown of the season and 11th of his career.

Trailing 17-10, Hills found freshman wide receiver D.J. Moore for a 40-yard touchdown that sent the game into halftime all tied up. Moore has three touchdown grabs on the year, the most by a Maryland freshman since current NFL standout Stefon Diggs had six touchdowns in 2012.

Wisconsin finished off a seven-play, 71-yard drive with a seven-yard touchdown pass from Joel Stave to Dare Ogunbowale less than a minute into the fourth quarter. That score gave the Badgers a 31-17 lead over the Terrapins.

With Rowe in at quarterback, the Terps moved the ball late in the fourth quarter. The junior completed five passes for 81 yards on a drive that culminated with a 27-yard scoring strike to Levern Jacobs with 2:39 to go to make it a 31-24 game.

Maryland recover the ensuing onside kick, but an offside penalty on the Terps nullified the play. Wisconsin was able to cover up the next onside attempt and run out the remainder of the clock.

Maryland's 24 points against Wisconsin, the nation's leading defense (11.0 points per game), is the most points scored against the Badgers since their season-opening loss to Alabama (35-17).

DEFENSE STRONG IN TERPS' LOSS TO SPARTANS

EAST LANSING, Mich. - Despite a standout day from the defense that included forcing three turnovers, the Maryland football team fell to #14 Michigan State, 24-7, Saturday at Spartan Stadium.

Junior defensive end Yannick Ngakoue posted 1.5 sacks in the game to bring his season total to 12.5 (second in the nation), while William Likely finished with 75 all-purpose yards to become the first defensive player (12th overall) in Maryland history to reach 3,000 career all-purpose yards.

The Spartans broke the scoreless tie eight minutes into the first quarter when quarterback Tyler O'Connor capped off a 10-play drive with a 10-yard touchdown pass to Macgarrett Kings.

The Terps immediately responded with their own 10-play scoring drive, as running back Brandon Ross crossed the goal line from one yard out. The drive was largely set up by Perry Hills and Levern Jacobs, who connected for 50 yards on the series.

The Maryland defense stood tall for the next 20 minutes of action, but it was Riley Bullough's interception for a touchdown that broke the 7-7 draw with 2:07 to play in the first half. Michigan State then added a field goal from 35 yards out to close the half, giving the Spartans a 17-7 advantage.

The Spartans extended their advantage in the second half when they finished an 11-play drive with a Gerald Holmes 3-yard rushing touchdown.

GAME 11 RECAP: INDIANA

ROSS ERUPTS FOR 250 YARDS IN TERPS LOSS

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Senior Brandon Ross became just the fourth Terrapin to rush for 250 yards or more in a game, but Maryland lost its 2015 home finale to Indiana, 47-28, at Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium Saturday afternoon.

Ross joins LaMont Jordan (306 yards vs. Virginia, 1999), Bruce Perry (276 yards vs. Wake Forest, 2001) and Josh Allen (257 yards vs. Virginia, 2003) as the only Terps to rush for more than 250 yards in a game. The senior also scored three touchdowns in the game, making him the first player in Maryland history to have at least 250 yards rushing in a game with three or more touchdowns.

The 250-yard performance also vaulted Ross up the career rushing list for the Terps. He now has 2,375 career rushing yards, which places him ninth on the all-time list, passing Willie Joyner (2,140 yards, 1980-83), Alvin Blount (2,158 yards, 1983-86) and Louis Carter (2,266 yards, 1972-74).

After the Hoosiers opened the game with a field goal, Maryland rattled off 21 straight points. On the Terps' second play from scrimmage, Ross raced 79 yards down the right sideline for the score to give Maryland a 7-3 lead. The 79-yard rush was the longest of the season for the Terrapins, surpassing Perry Hills' 75-yard rush at Ohio State.

Ross' 79-yarder was the longest TD run by a Terrapin since the 2010 Military Bowl when Da'Rel Scott had a 91-yard TD run vs. East Carolina on Dec. 28 at RFK Stadium.

After the Maryland defense forced a punt on the next IU possession, Ross gave the Terps a 14-3 lead with a 22-yard touchdown run down the right side. On the drive, junior quarterback Caleb Rowe went 4-of-6 passing for 50 yards.

A strip-sack by Yannick Ngakoue and a fumble recovery by Quinton Jefferson on the ensuing Indiana drive gave Maryland excellent field possession on the Hoosiers' 20-yard line. That led to a 14-yard TD pass from Rowe to Malcolm Culmer to make it a 21-3 lead for the Terps.

The sack by Ngakoue gave him the single-season record for the Terrapins with 13.5, surpassing the 13 put up by Bruce Palmer in 1978 and Mark Duda in 1982.

Indiana responded by scoring all 20 points in the second quarter to go into halftime with a 30-21 lead.

Ross wasted no time getting Maryland on the board in the third quarter. The senior took a handoff on the first play of the second half and sprinted 75 yards down the right sideline for his third long TD run of the game.

The scoring run was Ross' third of the day, setting a new single-game high for the senior in his final home game. The last time a Maryland player rushed for three scores in a game was Aug. 30, 2014 when C.J. Brown had three rushing TDs vs. James Madison.

The 75-yard run gave Ross 226 yards on 14 carries. The last time a Terp had 200+ yards on the ground was Dec. 29, 2010 when Da'Rel Scott had 201 yards on 13 carries vs. East Carolina in the Military Bowl.

Through three quarters Ross has racked up 228 yards on 17 carries. The 228 yards rushing were the most in a game by a Terp since 2003 when Bruce Perry had 237 yards vs. Wake Forest.

The third Ross touchdown was the final score of the game for the Terps, who played the entire second half without an injured Rowe.

GAME 12 RECAP: RUTGERS

TERPS SLICE RUTGERS IN COMEBACK VICTORY

PISCATAWAY, N.J. - Brandon Ross scored on an 80-yard run with 4:40 to play and Maryland erased a 21-point deficit to claim a 46-41 victory on Saturday.

After playing in his final game, Ross said the Terps' biggest comeback since overcoming a 20-point deficit against Virginia in 2006 should send a message to the returning players about never giving up.

"We wanted this win so bad, especially with how they came back on us last season," Ross said, referring to Rutgers rallying from a 25-point deficit to win. "We really wanted this one bad and we came back and got it."

Ross ran for three touchdowns for the second straight game and Ty Johnson carried for two more as the Terrapins (3-9, 1-7 Big Ten) gave interim coach Mike Locksley his first win in six games and snapped an eight-game overall losing streak.

Ross' go-ahead score came on the first play from scrimmage after Kyle Federico had put Rutgers ahead 41-39 with a 30-yard field goal with 4:57 to play.

Ross said the offense never doubted it would come back and take the lead.

"We knew at that point, we had momentum, and we were going to go down and get a score and the defense was going to stop them somehow," Ross said. "There was no doubt."

Ross scored on a counter to give his team the lead and Maryland's defense stopped Robert Martin twice for no gain at the Terps 38 to kill Rutgers' final drive with 1:25 to play.

"We all knew that we were going to come back," said backup quarterback Caleb Rowe, who came off the bench in the second quarter

and threw for 239 yards and ran for 98. "Nobody was down on themselves. It was something we have been through before. We just battled on back."

Kenneth Goins Jr. had given Maryland its first lead at 39-38 with a 42-yard touchdown run with 8:43 to play and Federico gave Rutgers its final lead on the next series.

Chris Laviano threw a career-best four touchdowns and Paul James ran for a touchdown for Rutgers (4-8, 1-7), which lost five of its final six games.

Ross rushed for 173 yards and also scored on runs of 16 yards and 1 yard. Johnson tallied on runs of 43 and 44 yards.

Maryland finished with 401 yards rushing and had 656 yards in total offense, the first time it has passed the 600-yard mark since 2004.

Laviano's touchdown passes covered 6 yards to Leonte Carroo, 6 yards to Josh Hicks, 7 yards to Janarion Grant and 1 yard to Charles Scarff.

Scarff's first career touchdown gave the Scarlet Knights a 38-27 lead late in the third quarter, but it would not be enough to hold off Maryland, which limited Rutgers to 10 second-half points after its biggest first half of the season.

Trailing 31-10 late in the second quarter after a 6-yard touchdown run by James, the Terps got back in the game by reeling off 17 straight points to close the gap to 31-27 on Johnson's 44-yard run.
